
#### DSA Band Program Commitment Form

## **Class Performance**

Band students will not improve if they do not come to class prepared and ready to work. The class performance grade allows students to receive credit for their hard work on a daily basis. **Students will lose points over the course of the week by not being prepared for class.** For example, a student will lose points if they do not have their instrument, music, pencil, lack of engagement, or not following classroom procedures.

## **Playing/Written Tests**

Playing tests are given on a regular basis. These playing tests are designed to demonstrate the skill level achieved by students within the band program. These tests can be given in various ways: solo performance, small group, separate room, or audio/video recording, We will use Canvas for some playing tests throughout the year.

### Written Assignment/Classwork

Various forms of assessments are used to evaluate students' musical knowledge. Students will be asked to demonstrate skills and measure understanding through written assignments. These may include ear training exercises, music theory, music history, rhythm counting, and concert/performance evaluations.

## **Performance Projects/Concerts**

Performances are the culmination of all the hard work and musical study that precedes them. They represent student achievement and highlight the band's accomplishments. Students are required to be at all performances and rehearsals in which their ensemble is involved. Please put band events on your calendars now and make transportation plans several weeks in advance. \*Concert grades are based on presentation (being on time, dressed properly, and proper stage and audience decorum) and musical performance. If a student misses a performance with a valid excuse, he/she can make up the performance by playing the music individually for a grade. Valid excuses for missing a performance include; death in the family, serious illness (with doctor's note), or other extreme family emergencies that must be verified by a written note from the parent/guardian.

## Practice

To be a successful, contributing member of the band, you are expected to practice on a regular basis. In the same way practicing math problems builds math skills, practicing an instrument builds technical and musical skills necessary for mastery. <u>Although practice is not part of</u> <u>your child's overall grade, practice will be evident in our</u> <u>weekly tests.</u> Parents are encouraged to support daily practice. You can help your child by setting aside the same time each day, recording how long they play, and even asking them to play for you.

## **Concert Attire**

Concert attire is an important part of performing. It instills in our students the responsibility to look professional as we perform for the public.

**Beginning Band:** Band t-shirt and black pants or skirt. Black dress shoes and socks.

<u>All other Ensembles</u>: Formal black and white with vest and bow tie.

Formal black and white is comprised of black dress pants/skirt, black dress shoes and socks, white button down shirt or top. No t-shirts, slippers, or tennis shoes! *Concert Dress Is Required!!!* 

## **Classroom Expectations**

The DSA band program has a high level of expectations for our students. To be successful, all students have to strive to meet the same goals! In order to reach our goals, we have a few simple guidelines:

**Be on Time:** Be in class by the tardy bell, and in your seat ready to play one minute after the tardy bell.

**Be Prepared:** Have all class materials every day—Instrument, Binder, Music/book, Pencil.

Be Engaged: Participate fully each and every day!

**Be Respectful:** Strive to put the ensemble before yourself in all that you do.

**No Food , Gum, or Drinks:** No food, gum, or drinks in the band room at any time other than bottled water.

#### Commitment

Commitment is the fundamental ingredient of a successful band. Band goes beyond merely teaching music, building important life and teamwork skills. Commitment is an important aspect for any successful endeavor. How do you show your commitment to the band program? For students it is attendance at rehearsals, daily practice, and concert performances. For parents, commitment is joining us for concerts to celebrate your students' accomplishments and helping at events. Band at DSA is a yearlong course and a year-long commitment. Students may only change courses at the end of each school year. Often times a student will experience a "writer's block" moment where they have difficulty progressing on their instrument. For some students, it feels easier to guit rather than to push forward and work through the slump. It is important to remember that these slumps do pass, and the student will begin to make progress again. All musicians go through this; it is a natural part of growing in maturity and musicianship. Our job as teachers, is to push and encourage them to stick with it. This is a great life lesson for students to see things through to the end, and develop their character and responsibility.

Consequences: Students who cannot follow classroom procedures and DSA behavior expectations are working against the success of the class. Minor disruptions, such as speaking without being recognized will receive a verbal warning. However, other infractions may result in a Tacet Seat assignment (or behavior reflection). All future issues will be handled by the DSA administration.

**ALL school rules and policies apply in our band class.** Major disruptions or infractions will result in a call home and an office referral. Students will not be permitted to disrupt or waste class instructional time.

## **Required Materials**

In addition to an instrument in good playing condition, you will need to have the following materials for class each day:

- Black 1" three ring binder
- Pencil
- Method book if required for your ensemble
- Accessories (valve oil, reeds, slide grease, neck straps, etc.)

#### The band program cannot provide these materials!

## School-Owned Instruments

School owned instruments are a limited resource. The school can provide large instruments such as tubas, baritones/euphoniums, bass clarinets, French horns, etc. All other instruments should be obtained by the student. School owned instruments are very expensive, and students who are using these instruments are responsible for repair and overall condition of those instruments throughout the year. Students renting a school instrument will have a \$60 fee for the year and must sign a contract. *Only students who maintain a passing grade and participate fully in class, will be allowed to rent a school instrument.* If you require a school instrument, please see a DSA band director for more information.

## Lockers

Band lockers are rented for students to safely store their instrument during the day. Band lockers can be rented for a \$5 fee for the year. Students who use a DSA band locker are responsible for memorizing their combination and keeping the locker clean at all times. **No food may be kept in lockers at any time.** Locks must be returned at the end of the school year. There is a \$5 fee for lost locks.

# Private Lessons

One of the best ways to improve as a musician is through private instruction on your instrument. Private lesson instructors serve as an ideal model and mentor to assist in your student's improvement in the areas of tone, technique, musicianship, and expert knowledge of the instrument. For more information about private lesson instructors, see one of the DSA band directors.

# **Class/Ensemble Placement**

There are six levels of band at DSA: Beginning Band, Cadet Band, MS Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Symphonic Band, and HS Wind Ensemble (other courses are available, but not part of the band concentration pathway). Class placement in each ensemble is based on an audition process and instrumentation. Auditions consist of several progressive excerpts that increase in difficulty. The audition is designed to demonstrate a student's proficiency in range, tone quality, articulation, dynamic control, musicality, rhythm/pulse control, and other musical elements. Students will have only one opportunity to perform the audition. Auditions are held in January or early February. In general, students should expect to spend more than one year in one of the mid-range bands while students work to improve performance skills. A student's ensemble placement is not guaranteed from year to year. It is possible for a student to move down a level based upon not meeting ensemble expectations or audition requirements. To complete their area of concentration, students must successfully complete one year of participation in Concert/Symphonic Band/HS Wind Ensemble.
